#### SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

## From the Pastor-The Holy Spirit of God

Focusing on God's presence within is a prevailing theme found throughout our liturgy this week. For the first time during this post-Easter season, the "Spirit of truth" makes an appearance. The success of the early church was primarily because of the gift of the Holy Spirit that enlightened the hearts and minds of the people. This presence of God enabled them to deal with many hardships and yet triumphantly speak of God's glory through the gift of Jesus. In our first reading from Acts we hear of the success of Philip in his evangelization of Samaria. This has traditionally been referred to as the second Pentecost, less spectacular than the first one in Jerusalem, but essentially with the same result: "they received the Holy Spirit."

The second reading for this week takes up the delicate issue of suffering in life. The author clearly tells the people, as he speaks to us, that suffering is not to be considered a punishment for sin, for it often comes "for doing good." The Old Testament notion of God punishing for wrongs done was a hard concept to break for the early disciples. The author clearly reminds us that suffering is certainly not the will of God. Rather God's will is that everyone finds true and lasting happiness.

In the gospel for this week, Jesus once again speaks about commandments. In our world today a lot of people think of commandments as burdensome and restrictive, interfering with their freedom. We are reminded in the gospel that the way we should look at commandments is that they are an expression of our love for God. It is easy for us to fall into the mindset that we obey commandments simply because it is law, we are being reminded today that they are an expression of love for God. The gospel begins and ends with the invitation to love Jesus by keeping His commandments. But this gospel is not just about our love; rather it speaks clearly about God's love for us. God does everything possible to share divine life with us, even to sending the Spirit.

On our own it is impossible either to know God or love God. This is why the gospel is so reassuring when Jesus promises us the Spirit who "remains with us, and will be in us." If we wish to grow in our love for God, we must first become attentive to the Spirit who dwells within us. We get to know the Spirit within us (who is really the presence of the risen Jesus in us) by taking sufficient time to be aware of the Spirit so near us.

Even though the relationship of Jesus to the Father is a difficult concept to grasp, at least we can relate to the "father and son" image. But how should we represent the Spirit as a Person in God? The only real image we find in the scriptures is that of a dove, but is that all we can say about this Spirit of God. It is true that we as Catholic Christians have a lot to learn about the Spirit. There is no doubt that the charismatic movement helped with the understanding of the Holy Spirit, but do we understand how that Spirit works in and through our lives? We know that the Spirit was present at creation, has inspired the prophets, and rested upon God's Servant and Messiah. It is the Spirit who has given us Jesus (the virginal conception) and has rested upon Him all His life, raising Him from the dead, to establish Him as Son of God in power. The same Spirit is also a gift from the Risen Christ to the church. The Spirit is the one who enables us to acknowledge God as Creator. The Spirit is always with us!
