

From the Pastor-The Great Celebration of Pentecost

The Jewish feast of Pentecost is one of three yearly pilgrim festivals that come from the books of Exodus and Leviticus. This great feast which we celebrate today was originally an agricultural celebration that focused around the harvest of first fruits. As time rolled by the feast became more intimately associated with the gift of the Torah that was presented on Mount Sinai. This feast of Pentecost continued its popularity right through New Testament times attracting large crowds of people to Jerusalem. It is in this atmosphere that the ancient feast took on a new meaning for the followers of Jesus. In our first reading for today, Luke refers to "devout



Jews from every nation under heaven staying in Jerusalem." He continues describing an impressive list of details in which he makes reference to "both Jews and converts to Judaism."

It was during this great celebration that the disciples experienced the gift of the Holy Spirit. As we read the encounter of that tiny church, we must use caution not to make the "Spiritual" gifts of the Holy Spirit something that is far removed from every day talents. Although the reports about the Holy Spirit were extraordinary; as baptized / confirmed Christians those events can be clearly seen in our world today. Even the "tongues" that the eleven spoke were clear and fearful proclamations of life giving truths that all present despite their differences were able to understand. The gifts of the Spirit are always to benefit all. As our second reading reminds us, the Gifts of the Holy Spirit are meant for the well being of the community and not for the sole advantage of those who receive them. However the Holy Spirit touched the hearts of those early disciples, they were certainly blessed with whatever gifts they needed to begin the church. It was that same Spirit that has guided the Church throughout the ages. It was that Spirit who gave to us the gift of Pope John XXIII and the Second Vatican Council. It is apparent that the Holy Spirit is just as active and alive today as it was in first century Jerusalem.

One thing that we can certainly say about the Holy Spirit is that it is unpredictable – just as the wind of the Spirit blows where it wills – it is past master in the art of creating big surprises. More than 50 years has passed since Vatican II, we are all aware that the spirit of Vatican II has faded considerably and that we are more in the defensive mode of survival than in a creative and enthusiastic renewal drive. We look at decreasing numbers in membership and we lament the lack of visibility of the church. But have we ever thought that the Apostles were just a small minority and did not have at their disposal a whole battery of experts and theologians to set the world on fire with the gospel? Yet, what seemed most improbable was made possible thanks to the Holy Spirit. And so the Apostles went out and started, with a handful of other disciples, to speak with boldness, conviction and joy and to spread the good news of the Resurrection. On this day of Pentecost, let us pray together and free our minds so that the Spirit may blow where it wills and create the church, the world, and all of creation anew!

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Feast of Pentecost

Today we celebrate the great feast of Pentecost! The Easter season lasts for fifty days, ending with Pentecost (the Greek word meaning

"fiftieth".) Ranking second only to Easter, the feast of Pentecost must be understood in the context of the Jewish feast by the same name. This prolonged festival celebrated the theme of harvest and thanksgiving. It evolved before the time of Christ into a memorial of the covenant. The weekdays between the Ascension and Pentecost are a preparation period for the outpouring of the Spirit. This great feast closes out the Easter season. It celebrates the overwhelming experience of God pouring out the Spirit upon the first community of those who believed lesus was the Lord and Christ. Pentecost is called, therefore, the birth of the church or the birth of the church's mission.
