

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

From the Pastor The Presence of God's Mercy

As we hear the Word of God on this Fourth Sunday of Lent we are reminded of redemption and God's mercy. In the first

e first

reading we hear about the political situation of the Jewish people who are reminded of the warnings spoken by the prophet Jeremiah that unless the people repented, they would have to pay the price for their infidelities. As a result Israel was taken into captivity and the people were the servants of the people of Persia. St. Paul in the second reading reminds us that "God, who is rich in mercy," is always with us. Then the gospel gives us the famous line, "God so loved the world that he gave his only son." In all three readings we see that God's incredible love for all people will never be undimmed.

We can see from our readings today that history has a way of repeating itself. There are so many times in life when God might be telling us something, or at least trying to tell us something and we just are not paying attention. Hind sight might help us to see what we should have been seeing all along. We have many prophets in our world today that are trying to get us to see God's hand in creation, but we are so caught up in our own lives, our own issues that we just aren't seeing what we should be seeing or hearing. In spite of the many mistakes we might make in life, in spite of the many things that go wrong in our world, we are being told today that God restores all things and brings back to life. When all seems hopeless and lost, it is when we learn to trust in God's care that we are given hope and situations get better.

As we look back to the people of Israel, one of the greatest lessons that can be learned is that God's mercy is always with us in life. The Jewish people often felt that they had to earn that mercy and love. They believed that when they did wrong God would take that mercy away and only when the people earned the love of God was it returned to them. St. Paul is quick to remind us that God's mercy is always there, we could never earn it. He tells us that we do not earn God's grace or mercy, and salvation is not something we can boast about. It has been said that "Christ is the savior of sinners rather than a rewarder of the sinless." Christian holiness and the good works we do are not the cause of salvation. They are the result of it. The Lenten season is a time when we respond more deeply and generously to the grace that inspires us to perform the good works of prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

The gospel shows us that eternal life comes from Jesus being lifted up on the cross. We simply cannot earn that ourselves, God freely gives us that gift through Jesus. It is through the death of Jesus that we are given life. We need to remind ourselves that the salvation that God brings to us is belief in Jesus accompanied by good deeds done in his name. God's mercy is always there, even when it is hard for us to see and recognize it. It is good for us to look back over our life and recognize how our lives have been changed by God's grace and mercy without any effort on our part. It is only when we realize how gifted we are with God's mercy, freely given that we are able to be lifted up and freely embrace this life that we have been given. PAGE I

A Gift of a Pig: To help hungry, undernourished families put protein back in their diets at little cost, Heifer teaches farmers how to raise healthy pigs even with scant resources. A farmer who may not be able to manage cows can raise pigs. In Latin



America, pigs eat rejected bananas or damaged yams that otherwise would be wasted. They grow to market weight while producing manure that improves crop production. Around the world, using resources once considered worthless, impoverished families supply themselves with the protein and income they need to build better houses, put their children in school and improve their lives.



A Gift of a Rabbit: Why rabbits? Because even a family without the land or resources to raise cows or even goats can find a warm dry spot – in a hutch on a back porch or perhaps even in a cool burrow dug beneath a garden planter – where rabbits can

thrive. They can be fed with vegetable waste and kitchen scraps, so they conserve farm resources as they grow. And, like other livestock, rabbits are sources of healthy protein to help feed the hungry. Their nitrogen-rich manure makes excellent fertilizer to put on crops as compost. And everyone knows how rabbits proliferate. Here's a gift that multiplies! With as many as 40 offspring a year, a trio of rabbits can provide a family with a steady source of protein and income.
